A Message from the Ambassador

Firstly New Years greetings to all and hopefully 2014 will be as good a year as 2013. It has been an exciting and action packed autumn and the Embassy has been involved in a large number of events, too numerous to recount here. Some of the more noteworthy are outlined below.

On a personal level, I am absolutely delighted that we have passed the \$1m target which I had set for Charity fund raising at the Residence. Charity fundraising started in a small way when I was approached by the group "The 3Cs Foundation," which raises funds for sufferers of Crohn's Disease, Colitis and Colorectal cancer. We held the first event in October 2010 and it was very successful. The whole process just snowballed from there. Over the last 3 years, a large number of groups, including some local Irish groups and those raising money for medical charities, have used the great facility we have here in the Embassy residence to hold events and raise money for charity. Apart from the great causes which have been served, it has been tremendous fun. I am very proud of the work that the Residence staff have done to make this initiative such a success.

Another highlight of the autumn was visiting New Brunswick with my wife Patricia. I had been to the Miramichi Irish Festival

previously, but on this occasion I was privileged to spend a week in that beautiful corner of Canada. I met with business groups, Irish community organisations and political figures. I was in three of the main urban centres, Moncton, Fredericton and Saint John. In all three areas there are thriving Irish societies. I even met with Chris Collins MLA in Moncton who is related to the legendary Irish leader Michael Collins. There is a striking resemblance to

Collins, see the above photo. The connections between New Brunswick and Ireland are phenomenal, especially with Saint John. The poignant famine burial site at Partridge Island stands testimony to that great wave of migrants which swept into Canada in 1847.

Things also moved along on the economic front. The long awaited and much anticipated free trade agreement between Canada and the EU (CETA) was finally settled after 4 long years of negotiation. Ireland is a very strong supporter of this agreement which it is estimated will add €250m per annum alone to our exports to

Canada. In particular, we hope to see much better access for Irish dairy products under CETA. Now that the politicians have agreed the

overall framework, it is up to individual commercial concerns to grasp the opportunity that CETA represents. I hope that many Irish companies will be beating a path to Canada and with the assistance of Enterprise Ireland will be making inroads in the Canadian market. Also Canadian companies will hopefully be looking to Ireland as a base to operate from to the whole of the massive EU single market of 550m people.

Montreal and Toronto Irish scenes continue to buzz with the 85th anniversary of the founding of the United Irish Societies in Montreal and the annual Toronto GAA dinner at the Hot House cafe. I was honoured to be a guest on both occasions.

The Montreal Centre also witnessed a gala dinner to celebrate the contribution of one of the most charismatic leaders of Irish Canada, Dr Brian O'Neill Gallery, to the School of Irish Studies in Concordia University. Brian's was an amazing fund raiser for the Foundation which underpins the school. During his period with the Foundation, Brian raised \$8m. I was delighted to present Brian with a Certificate of Irish heritage and also a letter of thanks from the President of Ireland, Michael D Higgins.

In Toronto, the visit of my old friend Máirtín Ó Muilleoir, now Lord Mayor of Belfast was a personal delight. I have known Máirtín for many years through some of the most difficult periods in Belfast's history. It is tremendous to see him now occupy the highest position in the city. He

gave a very warm and convincing promotion of his native city at a lunch co-hosted by Tourism Ireland and the Ireland Fund. Máirtín used the occasion to bestow the title of Belfast Ambassador on Hugo Straney and John Speers, two of the best known members of the Irish community in Toronto.

I had the opportunity of meeting again with the Prime Minister, Stephen Harper, in Ottawa who accepted a presentation of Guinness from Diageo Ireland. As usual the PM was very interested in discussing the economic situation in Ireland and also in the Irish heritage of his wife Laureen. He had a batch of Guinness named after him in commemoration of his visit to Dublin earlier this year.

And what about the Westjet announcement of direct flights from St John's to Dublin. It was brilliant and now there are 4 airline companies offering flights from Canada direct to Ireland and two of them, Rouge and Aer Lingus doing so on a year round basis. Also Air Transat will continue to operate out of Montreal and Toronto. I know it

was the chief objective of Canadian Ambassador to Ireland, Loyola Hearn to strengthen air links. Well done to Loyola. We should now get a clearer picture of the number of visitors to Ireland from Canada if more are coming direct rather than through third countries. All we need now is a direct flight from Western Canada, Calgary, Edmonton or Vancouver. It is certainly a much rosier picture than 3 years ago.

I should also mention the fantastic Innisfil Celtic Festival which takes place every year in

Business Gathering, Dublin

The Ireland Canada Chambers of Commerce here in Canada answered the Gathering call and together with their sister organisation, the Ireland Canada Business Association (ICBA) in Dublin, organised a Business Gathering in Dublin at the end of September last. 45 individuals travelled from Canada to participate in the event and on the day of event, the conference room at the Shelbourne Hotel in Dublin was packed to over 200 capacity. The Gathering focussed on trade and business links between Ireland and Canada and was in effect an Ireland Canada Business Summit. On the eve of the Summit, the Lord Mayor of Dublin, Oisín Quinn, kindly hosted a reception for the travelling delegates from Canada in the historic Mansion House.

The Summit was officially opened by the Minister for Transport, Tourism and Sport, Dr Leo Varadkar T.D. who spoke of the strong and historic links between Ireland and Canada and the potential these presented. The day was packed with speeches and panel discussions focussing on the

Ireland Canada business relationship. The Honourable John Manley, Chair of the Canadian Council of Chief Executives and former Deputy Prime Minister of Canada delivered the keynote address at the Summit, highlighting the benefits to both Ireland and Canada of the EU Canada free

EU And Canada Announce Agreement On Free Trade Deal

In October 2013, after almost 4 years of negotiation, the EU and Canada reached political agreement on a Comprehensive Economic and Trade Agreement (CETA). On the basis of the political breakthrough, the negotiators will continue the process and will work to settle all outstanding issues.

The CETA is the first free trade agreement between the European Union and a G8 country. It will remove 99% of tarriffs between both entities, and will create sizeable market access opportunities in services and investment.

The agreement is very good news for Irish exporters. Goods exports from Ireland to Canada have more than doubled since 2006 and the CETA will help to expand our already sizeable trade with Canada. As the most westerly country in Europe, and the closest geographically to Canada with similar values and culture, Ireland is well placed to take advantage of the opportunities

the CETA will present. Speaking on the day of the announcement, Minister for Jobs, Enterprise and Innovation Richard Bruton TD noted that the agreement has the potential to add over €200m in our bilateral trade with Canada.

Some technical work remains to be completed on an agreement of this size but it is expected to come into effect by the end of 2015–early 2016.

Kobo Announces Investment In Ireland

Kobo, the leading international e-reader company headquartered in Toronto, announced in November that it is to establish a software development centre in Dublin with the expected creation of over 30 highly skilled jobs. The new Dublin technology centre will provide software development support for all worldwide Kobo partners, as well as localisation and feature enhancements for all local markets. The investment is supported by IDA Ireland, Ireland's inward investment agency. Further information is available on www.idaireland.com

Bailout Exit

On 15 December 2013, Ireland formally exited the EU/IMF bailout programme. This means that Ireland will meet its funding needs independently on the international financial markets again. As the Taoiseach Enda Kenny stated in his address to the nation on the evening of December 15th, this is a very important step that sends out a powerful signal internationally. The Taoiseach stated that this important step required difficult decisions at home and tough negotiations abroad. As he put it "We had to act decisively to show investors and markets that we were serious about fixing our economic problems. This was tough - wages and services were cut and many families have had to face the devastating consequences of unemployment and emigration". The Taoiseach and his colleague the Minister for Finance thanked the Irish people for their forbearance throughout.

On the 17 December 2013 the Government launched a medium term strategy for economic recovery. At the launch of the document, the Minister for Finance Michael Noonan T.D. noted that while the end is now in sight, we are not there yet and must not dissipate hard won progress. The aims of the Government's Medium Term Economic Strategy will be to ensure that the mistakes of the past are not repeated; to set out a path for economic growth and employment and to identify new strategic priorities that will have the biggest impact on increasing the economy's potential growth.

On 7 January, the National Treasury
Management Agency sold 10 year debt for the
first time since exiting the bailout at close to
historic lows. Minister Noonan noted that the
yield of 3.54% "illustrated the strength of
Ireland's international reputation and brings us far
closer to the borrowing rates of the strongest
European economies."

While unemployment still remains high at 12.4%, there have also been some positive indicators on the job creation front, with 1200 jobs being created per week. Job creation remains a major priority for the Government.

Third Global Irish Economic Forum

The third Global Irish Economic Forum took place in Dublin Castle on 4-5 October 2013. In May 2013, the Taoiseach and the Tánaiste had issued invitations to members of the Global Irish Network which consists of 300 of the most influential Irish and Irish-connected individuals abroad, all of whom have demonstrated a strong affiliation with Ireland and have a record of high achievement in international business or in assisting in the promotion of Ireland.

The Forum was attended by Global Irish Network members, members of the Government, Ministers of State, senior officials, presidents of third level institutions, members of the opposition, and domestic business leaders for two days of intensive discussions.

The format of the Forum consisted of a mixture of plenary sessions, panel discussions, and working groups. Two new initiatives for the 2013 Forum were the hosting of regional roundtables in Cork, Galway and Belfast and a major networking event during which a number of Network members held a series of round table meetings with over 70 Irish SMEs.

Participants were asked to consider how the Forum can make significant contributions towards Government, Irish business and diaspora working together to deliver jobs and recovery and growing exports. Working groups were the central element of the Forum with 18 working groups meeting for a combined 90 hours over the two days. Under the chairmanship of a Global Irish Network member, each group was asked to produce 2-3 specific proposals for innovative ideas linked to priority challenges in the Government's Action Plan for Job. In total 63 recommendations arose from the

working groups. In closing the Forum, the Taoiseach and the Tánaiste undertook to examine by the end of November all the outcomes that came out of the Forum and to report back to participants on those deliberations.

Edmonton Delegation Visits Ottawa

The Embassy hosted an event for representatives of the Edmonton Economic Development Corporation and the Edmonton Chamber of Commerce at the residence in November. The groups were taking part in a joint mission to Ottawa. The Embassy had a working lunch with the group, which was also attended by our Honorary Consul General in Edmonton, Mrs. Doodie Cahill, head of Enterprise Ireland Canada office Ross O'Colmáin and local members of the Global Irish Network. We were honoured to be joined by the Hon Mike Lake MP, Parliamentary Secretary for Industry.

As Brad Ferguson, CEO of Edmonton Economic Development Corporation pointed out during an address to the Economic Club of Canada, the city of Edmonton is booming and has outperformed every other Canadian city in recent times. Edmonton generated \$81bn in GDP last year, up 4.9% on the previous year and over 100,000 jobs have been added to the local economy per annum. Edmonton is also seeking to become a hub for entrepreneurship.





IN MEMORIAM SEAMUS HEANEY 1939–2013 Nobel Prize Winning Irish Poet





EU Film Festival and the Irish Film Natural Grace



Provincial Profile: New Brunswick

Ambassador Ray
Bassett made a recent
visit to the Maritime
province of New
Brunswick, which is
home to a vibrant and
enthusiastic Irish



community. In this month's newsletter, we will take a look at the Irish connection between Ireland and beautiful New Brunswick.

The Ambassador was thrilled with the wonderful reception he received in New Brunswick, and was delighted to visit the province after being invited

by numerous Irish community groups. Dr Bassett met with prominent members of the New Brunswick political and business community, along with some companies who have strong Irish links. He honoured those pioneering Irish families who were among the first arrivals to the province in a wreath-laying ceremony, and had talks with members of the French-Acadian community as regards the teaching of a minority language,

and how to promote such endeavours. The Ambassador also took the opportunity to visit the beautiful St. Thomas University Campus, where the Irish language is being taught under the auspices of the Ireland-Canada University Foundation. It is hoped that the strengthening of

relationships between this university and Irish institutions will continue.

Irish Immigration And Settlement In New Brunswick.

During the middle of the 19th century, the Irish had reached the peak of their population group in Canada, and were numerically the largest ethnic group

outside of Québec. This was true especially for New Brunswick, where in 1871, Irish numbered 100,000 out of a total population of 285,000. The beginning of the timber trade brought the Irish to New Brunswick in large numbers, and both Protestant and Catholics alike made their new

homes
throughout the
province. The
Great Famine of
the "Hungry
Forties"
undoubtedly
contributed to
their influx.
Major
strongholds of
Irish settlement
include the main

city of Saint John, the Miramichi, and scatterings throughout the province such as the capital Fredericton.

Quarantine hospitals were located on islands at the mouth of the colony's two major ports, Saint John (Partridge Island) and Chatham-Newcastle

(Middle Island), where many would ultimately die. Those who survived settled on marginal agricultural lands in the Miramichi River valley and in the Saint John River and Kennebecasis River valleys, however, the difficulty of farming these regions saw many Irish immigrant families moving to the colony's major cities within a generation or to Portland, Maine or Boston.

Prominent Irish-Canadian Figures Of New Brunswick:

Stompin' Tom Connors:

The beloved father of
Canadian country, "Stompin"
Tom Connors was born in
Saint John, New Brunswick.
He quickly became the
subject of Canadian folklore

and a much-revered character in public knowledge. Romeo Dallaire affectionately remembers playing some of Connors' music to raise troops' morale in Rwanda, 1994. Connors passed away in March of 2013.

Noël A. Kinsella:

Noël A. Kinsella is a Canadian politician and Speaker of the Senate. Mr. Kinsella was born in Saint John, New Brunswick. He earned a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology from University College in Dublin, Ireland. Mr. Kinsella was appointed to the Canadian Senate on the recommendation of Prime Minister Brian Mulroney on September 12, 1990, as a Senator for New Brunswick. On February 8, 2006, he was named Speaker of the Senate by the Governor General on the advice of Prime Minister Stephen Harper. Mr. Kinsella is an honorary captain (N) of the Royal Canadian Navy.

Irish Culture In New Brunswick

The province of New Brunswick has a rich Irish

tradition and was almost called New Ireland, as a sister province to Nova Scotia. In recent years, Irish culture has flourished, and over 135,000 (19%) of the province claim Irish heritage. The province has an active Irish association, the Irish

Canadian Cultural Association of New Brunswick with chapters in a number of cities, the Irish Festival on the Miramichi has consistently drawn

large crowds and is one of the top tourism events in North America.

The Middle Island National Park commemorates those lost while travelling to Canada during the Great Famine. Middle Island is located in the

Miramichi River, approximately 2 km (1.2 mi.) east of downtown Chatham. The 6-hectare (15-acre) island lies between Beaubear's Island to the west and Sheldrake Island to the east. It is accessible by car via a causeway from Water Street, in Chatham.

The island was a quarantine station for immigrants to

Canada in the mid-19th century, specifically for Irish immigrants fleeing the Irish Potato Famine. In 1847 it was declared a permanent quarantine station by the Federal Government and remained so until 1948. Many perished while on the island. Every year, thousands of people gather on the Miramichi for jam-packed entertainment, while celebrating Irish culture. There is plenty of Irish music, dance, cultural and musical workshops, family reunions and storytelling, and a true appreciation of Irish culture and heritage.

A special mention should be afforded to St. Thomas' University, which was Founded by Irish Diocesan priests in the early part of the 20th century, in Chatham, New Brunswick. St.

Thomas University has had a long standing spiritual, intellectual and emotional connection with a vital, unique and living Irish cultural tradition. Today, St. Thomas University both acknowledges and honours the sacrifice and

Emigrant Support Programme

Grant Round OPEN

Background

The Emigrant Support Programme (ESP) was established by the Irish Government in 2004. The Programme provides funding to not-for-profit organisations and projects to support Irish communities overseas and to facilitate the development of more strategic links between Ireland and the global Irish. The focus of the ESP is on initiatives that: address the needs of the most disadvantaged and vulnerable Irish emigrants; enhance access for Irish community organisations to local statutory and voluntary services; foster a more vibrant sense of community and Irish identity amongst the Irish abroad and encourage closer links between Irish communities abroad and Ireland, to the benefit of both.

The Emigrant Support Programme is operated by the Irish Abroad Unit of the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade in Dublin, as well as our Embassies in a number of countries across the world. In the year 2012 for example, €11.6m in funding was disbursed to 187 organisations in 15 countries around the world.

Emigrant Support Programme in Canada

The ESP has operated in Canada since 2006. To date, over \$1m in funding has been awarded in grants to community organisations here. A full list of projects funded around the world, including Canada is available on the website of the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade in Dublin.

There Are Five Categories Under Which You Can Apply For A Grant:

- Capital: This is for applications for construction or refurbishment of a premises.
- Heritage: Projects involving the promotion of Irish heritage and identity abroad.
- Welfare Services for the Elderly: Projects supporting elderly emigrants, such as Irish Seniors Groups,
- Welfare Services for others, such as new emigrants. Our biggest project here in Canada in the past 2-3 years has been the Irish Canadian Immigration Centre in Toronto, which has received ESP funding in the amount of \$215,000 over the past three years.
- Business Networks- Projects to support Irish business networks overseas.

Over the past two years, the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, in conjunction with GAA HQ in Dublin, have also operated a separate open call for applications from GAA clubs in Canada in support of global games development.


All applications must be made online. Hard copy applications will not be accepted. Applicants should consult all relevant documentation below, including the overview of the programme and the online application user guide, and check their eligibility to apply, prior to making an application. To apply you must be a registered not for profit organisation. Please ensure to have the organisation's accounts to hand as you will be required to upload these at a certain stage of the application process.

The application process opens in mid-January each year. The application process for 2014 opened on Wednesday 15th January and will close on Wednesday 19th February 2014. 

New Irish Passport Design


The newly-designed Irish passport features images of iconic Irish landmarks including Croagh Patrick, Kylemore Abbey and Croke Park, in addition to drawings depicting Irish music and dance and Gaelic games.

At its launch on 30 September 2013, the Tánaiste and Minister for Foreign Affairs and Trade, Eamon Gilmore T.D., said: "We have combined the latest security technology with selected imagery in order to produce a passport which represents Ireland – our culture, our history, and our people.

"The images used range from a stunning perspective of the Cliffs of Moher to the new landscape along the river Liffey, with the Dublin Convention Centre to the foreground and the Custom House and Liberty Hall peering through the harp strings of the Samuel Beckett Bridge.



A combination of photographs and drawings, commissioned solely for use on the Irish passport, are reproduced with specialist printing techniques to ensure that the Irish passport is highly-secure. The book was designed and produced in Ireland, by a consortium led by DLRS of Bray, HID Ireland of Baile na hAbhainn, and the Central Bank. All Irish passports issued from 3rd October 2013 have this new design.

Passport by numbers:

More than 630,000 passports issued in 2012, of which about 350,000 issued to adults. 67% of all passport applications were received through the Passport Express channel.

Over 40,000 applications were received through the Northern Ireland Passport Express channel. Almost 53,000 applications were received through the London Passport Office, the highest number outside the State.

After London, the highest number was issued in Canberra - 5,600 passports, followed by 5,300 by the Consulate General in New York.

July was the busiest month in 2012 with 78,000 passports issued, while December was the

quietest with just over 20,000 issued.

The Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade provided consular assistance to more than 1,500 Irish nationals abroad in 2013. This represents an increase of 6.5 percent on 2012, continuing the upward trend of recent years.

Our Embassy here in Canada dealt with the 5th largest number of cases around the world in 2013. The Embassy also processed the 6th largest number of passport applications in the system, with just under 2600 passports issued by the Embassy in 2013.

Westjet Announces New Direct Flight Service To Dublin

In November 2013, Canadian airline Westjet announced that it will commence a new seasonal service in June 2014 between St John's Newfoundland and Dublin. As Westjet



themselves point out on their website, St Johns is geographically closer to Dublin than it is to Calgary. This will

be the first time that Westjet will fly to Europe.

This exciting news is a welcome addition to the greatly enhanced direct air access between Ireland and Canada in 2014. Last year, Irish airline Aer Lingus announced that it would commence a year round direct service between Toronto and Dublin from this Spring. Air Canada Rouge also announced that it would expand its seasonal Toronto-Dublin direct flight to a year round service. Air Transat already operates a seasonal direct service between Montreal and Dublin and Toronto and Dublin. Exciting times and lots of options to visit the Emerald Isle this year.

The Gathering

As most of you are well aware at this stage, 2013 was the year of the Gathering. Figures published by the Central Statistics Office in December showed that 2013 was an outstanding year for Irish tourism, with the number of overseas visits up by 7.1% compared to the corresponding period of 2012. Visits from North America were up by 13.8% for the eleven month period to the end of November.

The official Gathering website recorded in the region of 5000 Gatherings throughout the country in 2013. Hundreds of local volunteers in Ireland and communities got involved and the Gathering success is great credit to them as well as to all those abroad who travelled to be part of it. EMBASSY INFORMATION

Irish Citizens Travelling Or Living Overseas Register With The Department Of Foreign Affairs

Citizens who are outside the Common Travel Area, (Ireland/Great Britain) are encouraged to register their contact details with the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade. Registration is voluntary. It is a facility available to all Irish citizens and is intended for use by people travelling on holidays, and also for business travellers and Irish citizens living overseas. While we encourage everyone to register, the facility is particularly useful for people travelling to remote destinations or locations where they may be at risk. The registration system records the dates on which people expect to be abroad, so it is worth registering, even for short trips. When you register your details with the Department, it means that we can contact you if there is an unforeseen crisis such as a natural disaster or civil unrest or if you have a family emergency while you are overseas. If there is a major crisis abroad, the Department already has a record of your details, so we can contact you at an early stage in a crisis. Your registration will assist us to locate you and, if necessary, provide assistance to you and your family in Ireland.
